



SPECIAL 2015.2 v.1 - TROON

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A series will be published online which summarizes, supplemented by recent discoveries, information published over the years in IslandsKontakt and elsewhere. We must all be grateful for the sustained efforts of all those who, over the years, as Editors or Authors have contributed to the gathering and dissemination of information relevant to the philately of Iceland.

This article is no. 2, and Troon in Ayrshire, Scotland, as a transit port for Icelandic mail in the period 1897 to about 1923 is the subject of this report.

Each of these articles will be published "as a manuscript" and labelled "v.1". Readers are invited to submit corrections and/or supplementary material including scans to one or other of the compilers with a view to possible inclusion in a revised "v.2". The process of revision will be open ended and need not finish with "v.2".

Line drawings appearing in this series of articles are, in general copied from Robertson or in the case of Scottish date stamps, Mackay. Illustrations of covers or cards taken from the literature are credited as such in the tables where these items are cited.

Through use over years of service it is inevitable that post office handstamps should show signs of wear. The two principal types of material for the manufacture of these handstamps are metal (brass or steel) and rubber. Damage to a metal handstamp will show as bumps or breaks on the periphery or on the text. The damage to rubber handstamps will be caused by the flexible nature of the rubber and the effect of unsuitable inks which cause the rubber to stretch and otherwise to deteriorate. The rubber paquebot handstamps used in Edinburgh show such damage and this makes them difficult to classify (and it may be that the office was issued with more than one example of a particular manufacture leading to independent deterioration on each example).

Pór Porsteins has compiled a list of sailings from Iceland. Here, this list as it applies to any given port is reproduced with, where possible, examples of mail with the carrier and sailing identified. A sailing may appear on the list with no recorded cover or card, but because it was listed as carrying mail, there is hope that an example will turn up at some future time.

The primary purpose of this article and the accompanying listing is to match each cover/cards, usually from Iceland, but where appropriate, the Faroes, with the vessel that carried the item. As a bonus to this listing is the possibility of a census of the occurrence of the various ship letter and paquebot marks seen on mail from Iceland.

Note that the Postal Authorities (GPO) of the United Kingdom made a distinction between incoming and outgoing ship letters. Incoming ship letters might receive a handstamp of the point of entry. Outgoing ship letters are identified by an annotation on the address panel such as "by private ship" or more specifically "by [name of vessel]". Circulars were issued on a regular basis listing private vessels which would take mail, together with sailing dates and destinations. Use was made of this service because it could be quicker than the Packet (i.e. the official mail boat).

Troon in Ayrshire, Scotland as a transit port for Icelandic mail in the period 1897 to about 1923 is the subject of this report. Of the town and its harbor, Wikipedia tells us:

"The Duke of Portland took the existing natural harbor on the north side of the headland and added docks. Later improvements included increasing the protection afforded by the headland with an artificial "ballast bank" made from the dumped ballast of incoming merchant ships. And from 1812 Troon was the terminus of a horse-drawn railway connecting it to the Duke's coal mines around Kilmarnock. This was not licensed for passengers, a minor technicality evaded by weighing those wishing to travel and charging them freight rates."

Of interest also are the two Ship Letter marks and four circular date stamps (abbreviated CDS) which appear on mail from Iceland, usually as transit cancels and (perhaps) occasionally in lieu of paquebot cancels (in the sense of the UPU regulation, which came into effect 17 January 1894, governing uncancelled mail arriving, usually with foreign stamps, at a port). Surprisingly, all the recorded covers/cards with the boxed mark also have an Icelandic postmark.

This register of Troon marks on mail from Iceland shows that the scarcity of the boxed Troon Ship Letter mark has been grossly exaggerated.

List of Troon Transit Marks

The two Ship Letter marks

1) Oval GR metal ship letter handstamps were issued to various ports, including Troon, sometime around 1814 during the reign of King George III.

This mark is known used in 1832 (and is quite rare from that period) then again in 1897 and 1898 by which time the mark had suffered wear and the R (for Rex) could be mistaken for an H.

Two items from the Faroes and one from Iceland in 1897 are recorded with this handstamp, as well as one item from Iceland in 1898.

This makes four examples of the mark recorded on mail from Iceland and the Faroes before the boxed two line Troon /Ship Letter brass metal handstamp was manufactured by Kirkwood at the beginning of 1899 and forwarded to Troon by the postal authorities on 4 February 1897).

This mark is catalogued in Robertson as S1 and by Hosking 4th edition as 5205. ³

This mark appears as a type in James A. Mackay, "Scottish Post Marks" as no. 1646, but Troon is not discussed in the text on page 123.



Here is one of the four examples, a Brjefspjald to Silkeborg in Denmark send from Reykjavik 5.8.1897.



2) Rectangular boxed two line cancel SHIP LETTER/TROON



This mark is Robertson S2 and he indicates the handstamp was sent to Troon on Feb 4 1899. He records the earliest and latest dates as 1904 and 1912. It is shown in James A. Mackay, "Scottish Post Marks" as no. 1674 and Hosking 4th edition as 325 indicating use from 1900 until1912. Now items with the boxed ship letter mark of Troon are known from 1900 to 1914.

Oddly, all the items here recorded for the boxed handstamp have been cancelled by the Icelandic Post Office reducing the use of the Troon marks to the role of transit cancellations. From other ports, letters with the postmark of the port as the first cancellation are known: such mail required a paquebot mark in order to satisfy the UPU regulation which came into force 17 January, 1894.

DAMAGE to the canceller: Sometime after 10 10 1906 handstamp for the boxed mark must have been dropped or been damaged in some way or other way the later applications of the mark all show a dent in at the top of the right hand Framed S/L line as well as two breaks in the top Framed S/L line. There also is a dent in the bottom Framed S/L line and a smaller one just after the "N". Not long after this a larger bump appears below the first "O" of Troon.

- 3. The Circular Date Stamps of Troon on Icelandic mail
- 1) Small single ring (thimble) circular date stamp of which there are two versions (perhaps the same hammer slightly modified):
- a) one with the letter "A" above the date (according to Schilling, known on mail from 1901 to 1904),⁴



b) the other with an empty space above the date (recorded on a pair of 20 aur red Christian X stamps).



- 2) Double ring circular date stamp of which there are two types:
- a) twin arcs also referred to as wings) enclosing the town name Troon at the top and the office number 330 at the bottom. The type is no. 538 in "Scottish Post Marks" by Mackay.



b) Twin arcs or wings enclosing the town name Troon at the top and a cross at the bottom. ⁵

Mail in transit through the Troon office is known without the Ship Letter mark, having received only a Troon CDS of one or other type. According to Schilling used from 1906 to 1912 – but it appears in 1904. These particular circular date stamps of Troon are not explicitly referred to by James A: Mackay in his rather comprehensive book "Scottish Post Marks, but the type is no. 538.

REGISTER OF SAILINGS FROM REYKJAVIK TO TROON WITH, WHERE POSSIBLE, EXAMPLES OF MAIL CARRIED WHICH RECEIVED A TROON TRANSIT MARK

For a particular sailing to be in the following tables, the ship must be known to have carried mail and to have made its first British port of call Troon.

Diligent reporting by members of Islandsklubben over the years now allows individual covers/cards with a Troon transit mark to be linked to the ship that carried the item from Iceland. A sailing may appear on the list with no recorded cover or card -but an example might well turn up in the future. The task of recording continues.
